Library Appreciates Its Volunteers

National Library Week, April 2-8, is a time to celebrate the contributions of libraries, librarians, library workers, and library volunteers to their communities.

The East Baton Rouge Parish Library does not operate by the working-hands of its staff alone. Along with library staff, many volunteers offer their time and talents to help make the Library an excellent system of community services and resources in East Baton Rouge Parish.

Ranging in age from teens in Library advisory groups to seniors in the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), volunteers, both business professionals and retirees, assist with annual programs such as *Attic Treasures and Collectibles*, the *Author/Illustrator Program*, Summer Reading Club parties, and library gift book sales. Volunteers help with the daily operations of the Library, such as shelving paperbacks, sorting gift books, and maintaining collections.

Louisiana State University, Southern University, and Baton Rouge Community College students have organized service learning projects for their students within the library. Projects have included bibliographic development, inventory and stack maintenance of print and audiovisual collections, helping with library programs, and packing up the entire Delmont Gardens Branch Library collection for the move to its new facility.

Volunteers at the Scotlandville Branch have assisted library staff with special Black Heritage projects, displays, and the organization and maintenance of the Vertical File collection of newspaper clippings and brochures about local and regional history and events.

In addition to retired teachers and math professionals from local institutions such as the Southern University Math Department, members of the Baton Rouge Chinese

Association assist elementary, middle, and high school students with math tutoring at several locations.

Volunteers with the Greater Baton Rouge Pan-Hellenic Council assist hurricane evacuees at the East Baton Rouge Parish Library's Internet/Homework Help Library located at the Renaissance Village trailer park in Baker.

Members of the Junior League of Baton Rouge are currently helping to compile the Library's Obituary Database. Volunteers search newspaper microfilm archives, locate and photograph area cemeteries, write driving instructions to those locations, and contact area churches to obtain death information from their records.

Seasoned genealogy buffs provide informal assistance on a regular basis to beginners who are researching their family histories

in the Genealogy Room at the Bluebonnet Regional Branch Library.

Whether lending a hand at a major Library event or simply organizing the bookshelves, Library volunteers have contributed in their own special ways to help bring our parish's diverse culture together and to make the East Baton Rouge Parish Library system a reflection of the community it serves.

Philistoria Celebrates 100 Years!

Founded in 1906 by Mrs. T.M. Hunter and Mrs. R.L. Goyer, the Philistoria Study Club is a 25-member literary club which selects a topic of study for each year. The club coined its name from a Greek word that means "lovers of history." Each member, with the exception of those on the yearbook committee, presents a paper on the selected topic.

The Philistoria is a serious study club that comes together not just to entertain each other, but to learn. Over the years East Baton Rouge Parish Library librarians have pulled books and kept them on reserve for Philistoria members to use.

Club meetings are very formal and have been frequently held at the Main Library. The club president conducts the meeting and addresses each member by their formal married name. At the annual club luncheon, invitations, decorations and the menu all carry out the theme of the year of study. Members often don costumes as part of the presentation.

Celebrating their 100th anniversary, the Philistoria study Club hosted a tea on March 15 at the Baton Rouge Country Club. At that time the club presented a \$200 donation to the Library for the purchase of Louisiana reference books. The selected books include *The Newcomb Style*, *Charting Louisiana*, *Five Hundred Years of Maps*, and *Historic Louisiana, an Illustrated History*.

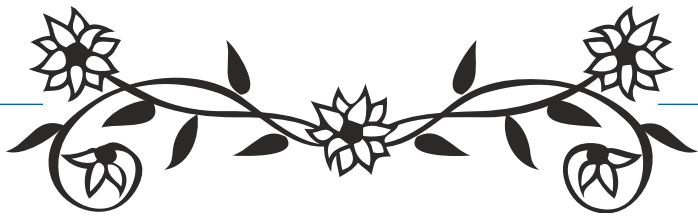
Affordable family trips close to home

THREE GENEROUS GENERATIONS

Author Anne Butler will discuss the research and writing of her book *Three Generous Generations* at the Zachary Branch Library on Wednesday, April 26, at 7:00 p.m. The book tells the story of the Friedman, Freyan, and Odenheimer families—three Jewish families who settled in St. Francisville.

Arriving penniless from Germany in the 1850s to escape persecution and prejudice in the Old Country, the patriarch of the family prospered and rose to prominence by the time he moved to New Orleans around the turn of the century. When he died, his obituary called him one of the wealthiest men in the state. He fought in the Civil War with his new neighbors, survived the burning of Bayou Sara, built a booming business empire of drygoods stores, cotton gins, saloons and opera houses, weathered Reconstruction and hard times, and eventually left St. Francisville to run Lane Cotton Mills in New Orleans. His descendants continued his legacy as community benefactors across the country. One granddaughter, when she died in her mid 1990s in California, left a sizable donation toward the restoration of St. Francisville's first public school, funded by her grandfather a century before.

Butler donated the copyright of this work to the West Feliciana Historical Society and all sales proceeds benefit the society's preservation projects. Her other published works include *Angola*, *Dying To Tell*, *Weep for the Living*, and the *Audubon Plantation Country Cookbook*. She regularly writes articles for *Country Roads* and other publications.

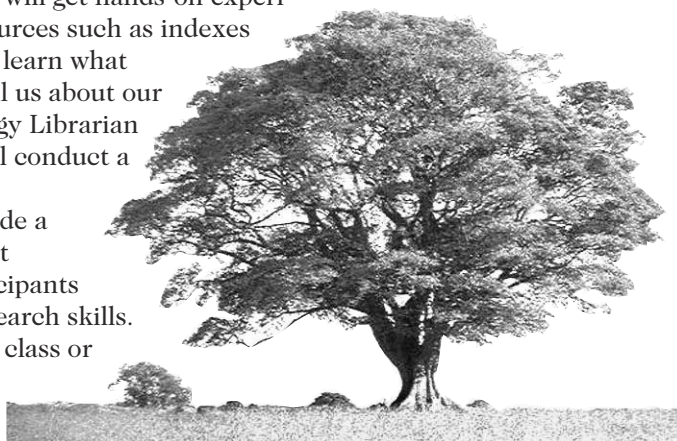
