

Children's Services offers reading and learning materials





Author Ronlyn Domingue will discuss her debut novel *The Mercy of Thin Air* at the Main Library on Sunday, August 13, at 3:00 p.m.

Set in New Orleans in the late 1920s, *The Mercy of Thin Air* follows medical school student Razi Nolan in the middle of a passionate love affair. She drowns in a poolside accident and slips into a state "between life and whatever comes next." Unable to cope with following her lover's life until some 70 years later, Nolan

wants to find out what happened to her beloved. She is drawn to Amy Richmond and Scott Duncan, a young couple whose troubled relationship

The Library is further expanding the One Book One Community concept. Plans and committees are being formed for a winter/spring One Book One Community program sponsored by the East Baton Rouge Parish Library and the Baton Rouge Area Chamber. This program will extend over nine parishes—Ascension, East Feliciana, East Baton Rouge, Iberville, Livingston, Point Coupee, St. Helena, West Baton Rouge, and West Feliciana, and will include public programs and lively discussions for a wide range of readers and interests, from middle school age through retirees. The title of the selected book will be announced later in the fall. Discussion leaders will be trained in November, with programs and discussions scheduled for January through March 2007. Committees will include Public Relations, Target Audiences, Program Planning, Discussion Groups, and Fundraising and Sponsorship.

Looking At: Jazz, America's Art Form

The Library has been selected as a program site for the viewing and discussion series *Looking At: Jass, America's Art Form.* The series will explore the cultural and social history of jazz as it developed into an art form in the United States.

A monthly video and discussion series and related community programs will explore six themes in jazz history—New Orleans: The Birthplace of Jazz; The Jazz Age and the 1920's; The Jazz Swinging Era; The Women of Jazz; Jazz Innovators; and Latin Jazz. Special programs will include jazz photography exhibits, authors, feature film showings, jazz dance, poetry, and art improvisation. Live jazz performances will be presented throughout the parish. The Library will record musicians' oral histories.

Updating Your Genealogy Tool Box Annual Genealogy Conference

The Library will hold its annual Genealogy Conference at the Bluebonnet Regional Branch on Saturday, August 5, from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Guest speakers Tammy Pruet-Northrup and Colleen Fitzpatrick, Ph.D., will discuss new research tools and technological advances in DNA research and optical laser technology useful in uncovering genealogical information.

Pruet-Northrop, manager for the DNA Unit of Louisiana State Police Crime Laboratory, will talk about the Louisiana DNA database and the role DNA research played in the Hurricane Katrina Relief project. A native of Baton Rouge, Pruet-Northrop is a graduate of LSU with a Bachelor of Science degree in Accounting and a 1991 graduate of the Paul M. Hebert Law Center at LSU. She authored the original version of the Louisiana CODIS law, the first piece of legislation in the country to authorize DNA sampling of arrestees, as well as the expansion of that law authorizing the collection of all convicted offenders and arrestees for felony offenses.

Fitzpatrick, author of *Forensic Genealogy*, widely recognized for its innovative application of forensic science investigative techniques to genealogical research, and co-author of *DNA & Genealogy*, will discuss forensic genealogy and photographic analysis. She is a recognized expert in optical and laser measurement techniques and has extensive experience in the development of innovative technologies for NASA, the National Science Foundation, and the Department of Defense. *Forensic Genealogy* has been featured on NPR's *Talk of the Nation* with Neil Conan (July 2005), and was the cover article for *Internet Genealogy* (Online Bonus Edition June 2006), *Family Tree Magazine* (April 2006) and *Family Chronicle* (October 2005).

The Louisiana Calligraphy Guild will be at the Library from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. to assist with four-generation family charts. From 2:00 to 3:00 p.m., Dr. Fitzpatrick will give a brief discussion on how to set up a surname DNA project. Participants are asked to bring family pictures.

Genetics and African-American Genealogy



Who are we? Where did we come from? Can DNA answer these questions?

Most African-Americans can trace their roots back to slavery before hitting a dead end. However, recent scientific breakthroughs in DNA have led to a whole new field of study in genealogy. New doors are opening in the area of African ancestral research. Geneticists and genealogists are working together to find clues that bring light to unanswered questions.

Russell L. Jacquet-Acea, author of the book *The Sons & Daughters of Jean Baptiste Jacquet: The History of the Black Jacquet Families in Louisiana*, will discuss these new discoveries, as well as his own research, at the Baton Rouge Genealogical and Historical Society meeting on Saturday, August 19, at 10:00 a.m. at the Bluebonnet Regional Branch Library.



New Appointments to the Library Board of Control

The Metropolitan Council appointed new member Stephen Moret to the East Baton Rouge Parish Library Board of Control on Wednesday, June 14.

Moret, president and CEO of the Baton Rouge Area Chamber of Commerce, will take the position vacated by long-term board member John Carnahan. President of the Library Board of Control from 1994 to 2006 and a member for more than 22 years, Carnahan stepped down from his position in June.

Expressing pride in what he helped accomplish for the Library, Carnahan said "We have come a long way since the beginning and I am enthusiastic about Stephen Moret coming on board. I feel real good about this operation."

During his tenure, Carnahan was involved in three tax referendums in which funds collected built new facilities throughout the parish; increased hours of service; greatly expanded collections; installed an automated catalog and computer system; and provided computers for library staff and the public with access to the Internet and online databases.

Stephen Moret brings expertise in the areas of business, health, environment, education, marketing, and public affairs to the Library Board of Control. His breadth of knowledge and experience makes him the ideal choice to help carry on the Library's mission.

"One of my greatest dreams," says Moret, "is for the Baton Rouge area to become a learning community."

"Few things are more important to making this dream a reality than supporting the growth and development of our public libraries. For that reason, I am delighted and honored to join the East Baton Rouge Parish Library Board of Control. I also am humbled to be replacing John Carnahan who has so faithfully served the citizens of Baton Rouge on this board for over 20 years. Mr. Carnahan helped see the library through some of its greatest challenges and development milestones. All of us owe him thanks for his many years of dedicated, selfless service to our community."

The Library Board of Control consists of five members who have the authority in the operation of the Library to hire the library director; establish written policy; secure adequate funding; approve the budget; provide and maintain facilities, resources, and services; help promote and advocate for the library; help develop and approve the library's plan of service; and participate in opportunities for continuing education.

On Thursday, June 15, the Library Board of Control voted to elect Georgia Brown as the new president. Previously the Vice-President, Brown has been a Board member since 1983. She is a retired educator and library administrator. Daniel Reed was elected Vice-President. A local attorney, Reed has been a board member for 11 years. The fifth board member is retired educator Katherine Auer.
