

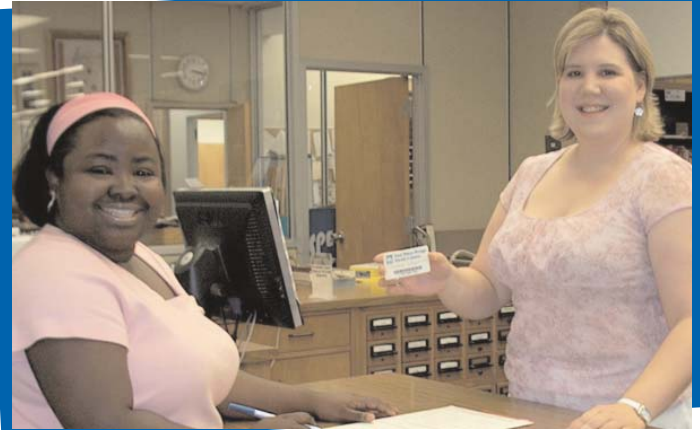

What other card in your wallet gives you free access to books and CDs, movies, recorded books, magazines, computers, and all sorts of other resources that can change your life, or just make it a little more fun?

The Library welcomes all people, regardless of age, physical ability, income, language, ethnicity, or geographic location. With 13 convenient locations and extended hours to serve you, the Library offers free programs and workshops for everyone – from storytimes and computer classes to business and career resources.



You can check out books, magazines, audio books, CDs, videos and DVDs. You can even get research help. Internet access is also available at the Library, along with application software such as Microsoft Word, Excel, Access, PowerPoint, and Publisher, and special online databases which include magazines, health information, biographies, literature resources, genealogy research, and even car repair!

Library Card Categories

Beginning November 1st, the Library is requiring that all patrons bring their valid East Baton Rouge Parish Library Card to continue using the full services offered by the Library. By obtaining a library card, patrons will be able to check out books, paintings, and media items, use the computers in all library branches, access online databases, place holds and perform many other library functions. See just how easy getting a library card can be:

**Maximum fines for print materials from the Children's Collection is \$1.00 per book or magazine, per checkout or renewal. Maximum fines for all other printed materials from the Adult and Teen/Young Adult collections is \$3.00 per item, per checkout or renewal.

Carver Branch Library Wins Rose Award!

The Baton Rouge chapter of the American Institute of Architects has awarded the Rose Award, its highest design award, to the Carver Branch Library, one of two projects receiving the award. The library was designed by Remson, Haley, Herpin Architects. Rose Awards are an acknowledgement by the architects' peers for their outstanding work.

The 12,081-square-foot library includes a covered drive-through at the entrance and a beautifully landscaped courtyard complete with a fountain. Its expansive glass walls frame a spectacular and breathtaking view of the Mississippi River Bridge.

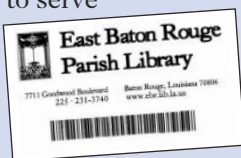

Do you have something of value in your attic? An heirloom piece of jewelry or a collection of stamps?

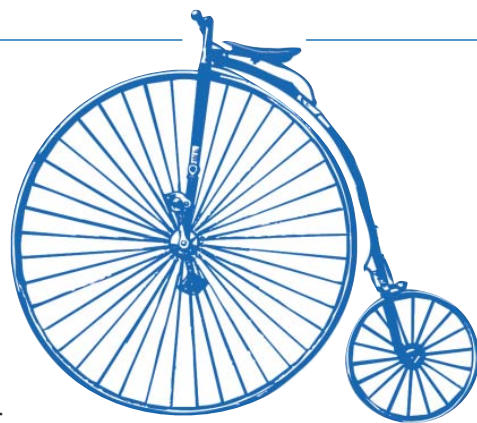
Here is your chance to learn if your collectibles, treasures, and antiques are really worth something!

The East Baton Rouge Parish Library's sixth annual *Attic Treasures & Collectibles* will be held on Saturday, September 16, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., at the Greenwell Springs Road Regional Branch Library.

The event will feature approximately 20 local and regional collection specialists who will identify and evaluate items, such as dolls, stamps, coins, jewelry, pottery, beads, glassware, books, and paintings. Each person is limited to three items.

Library books and magazines on antiques, collecting, restoring, and appraising will be available for checkout at the event.

p4A Antiques Reference Database

The Library's *p4A Antiques Reference Database* is used by most leading personal property appraisers throughout the United States (including many *Antiques Roadshow* appraisers) to evaluate almost every kind of antique in today's collections. The database offers real market-based information about antiques, artwork and family treasures and is available at every library.

Antiques are organized into 1,280 different classifications on subjects including furniture, glass, pottery and porcelain, paintings, prints, clocks, toys, dolls, advertising collectibles, books, autographs, lamps, silver, firearms and historical documents. Each record includes information on when and where the item was sold, as well as the price realized.

The *p4A Antiques Reference Database* is also unique in having at least one color picture for every record. Library patrons can actually see if the item they are researching closely matches the one described in the database. Each record has a text description and many have reference notes with background and context information.

Library Receives Grant To Assess Baton Rouge Room

The Library received a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Division of Preservation and Access to assess the Library's Baton Rouge Room. The NEH is an independent grant-making agency of the U.S. government dedicated to supporting research, education, preservation, and public programs in the humanities.

Located in the River Center Branch Library, the Baton Rouge Room contains a remarkable number of primary documents about Baton Rouge and East Baton Rouge Parish.

The grant has enabled the Library to conduct an assessment of materials in the collection. Elizabeth Dow, Ph.D., professor of Library and Information Science at LSU, performed an on-site assessment of the collection and evaluated the physical facility, security and access policies, and storage methods and materials.

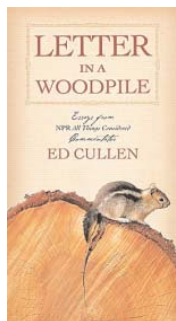
"The Baton Rouge Collection, if properly developed and managed," said Dow, "could become a catalyst in developing in a comprehensive understanding of Baton Rouge's past and thereby inform the development of its future in its new role as Louisiana's largest city."

Library staff envisions transforming the collection into a distinctive well-organized community-based research collection occupying its own distinct quarters. By focusing on the preservation of the civic, social, governmental, and business history of Baton Rouge, the Baton Rouge Room Collection will fill an important need, especially in view of the devastation of special collections of other libraries following Hurricanes Katrina and Rita.

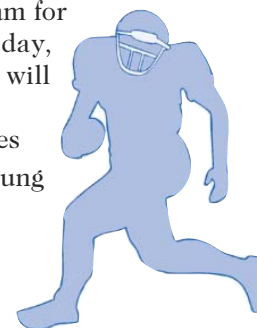

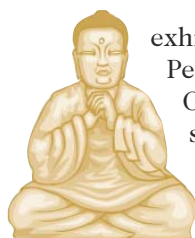

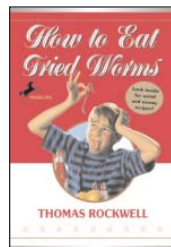
