
and an MPhil in **Cuneiform Studies from**

Ancient Near East, He is also a newspaper



Libraries Change Lives Features: Power User, Darren Jones

Libraries Change Lives

Darren Jones was born in Lancaster, CA, but his slight southern accent and unmistakable genial demeanor quickly gives away the place he claims as home: "My mom was a country woman from Georgia. I bounced back and forth, but I was mostly raised in Georgia." After receiving an M.A. in Philosophy from San Francisco State University in 2012, Darren landed a job at Baton Rouge Community College (BRCC). Since 2015, he has taught courses such as Intro to Philosophy, Intro to Logic, Religious Ethics, and Bioethics.

Darren's dream didn't stop at BRCC. His goal is to teach at a university like LSU or Tulane. But that dream was met with some healthy skepticism at first. "My mom said, 'Be a doctor or a lawyer. Philosophy don't make money,'" he laughed. Indeed, mothers can be just as encouraging as they are pragmatic about their children's futures. Nevertheless, Darren excelled in philosophy classes, really enjoyed it, and was able to mold it into a profession. "I just stuck with



it. It's a dream job to be a philosophy teacher. I'm making a living, and [my mom's] so proud!" But to teach at the university level, Darren needed a PhD. During the Covid-19 pandemic, the California Institute of Integral Studies (CIIS) offered, for the first time in its history, a fully online PhD program "that they've never

done before, and likely will never do again." Darren asserted, "I've got to strike while the iron's hot." Now, he is nearly across the finish line, as he prepares for his thesis defense and is in the final stages of editing his dissertation on Aristotelian Ethics: "A New Meta Ethic: Addressing Global Concerns."

In perhaps small yet meaningful ways, the Zachary Branch Library was able to ease the financial burden of higher education and help Darren achieve his dream. In 2020 he purchased a home not far from the Zachary Branch. "It's quiet out here. I'm a five-minute drive from the Library and Rouses!" It was at this remote branch where Darren was able to save an enormous amount of money by using free resources like printing (20 free pages per day), Wi-Fi, and easily accessible philosophy textbooks and articles, both in print and digital formats. Even when texts weren't physically at the branch. Darren was able to utilize the interlibrary loan system-a process by which a library


> requests material(s) from another library. "I've saved a lot of money with the library. Hundreds, if not thousands. Academic textbooks are expensive. They come out with new editions every couple of years. One textbook could easily cost \$200!" While writing his thesis, he has used at least 50 textbooks; the Library accounted for nearly 2/3 of the textbooks he cited.

> Someone who has been particularly helpful to Darren in his search for philosophy books is Library Staff Member Tari Oliver; she has been

vorking in libraries for 12 years and counting, 7 years in Ponchatoula and 5 here in East Baton Rouge Parish. "I try to be helpful and friendly with everybody. I see a lot of patrons at the circulation desk. Darren stood out. He was so excited and enthusiastic because he got his books from the Library. Maybe I helped him find some





books, I don't know. I like to think I was just doing my job." Tari may have just been doing her job, but Darren made clear that she went above and beyond in helping him. Tari is part of the reason he felt so welcome at a place that serves not only as a depository of books, media and information, but also a community center for fun activities for his son. "He's a big fan of the Library, especially the live music events and Movies on the Plaza." Darren has integrated the Library's innumerable, free services into his work, his education, and his personal/ family life. If you or someone you know are pursuing educational advancement, please take note of his sage advice: "The Library should be your first stop!"




